### MARTLESHAM HEATH HOUSEHOLDERS LTD

If you are reading this, could I ask you to have a walk outside your property and look  
at the boundaries to see if any of your plants or trees are overhanging in such a way  
as to impede the ability of people to walk past without having to duck or move on to  
the grassed areas. If there is a problem could you please deal with it. The  
Householder is responsible for the whole property, including the garden.

On July 13<sup>th</sup> the Anglia in Bloom judges will have visited the village and looked in  
particular at the Green, Western Corridor, Drought Garden and School project  
amongst other things. The village usually achieves at least silver gilt level award and  
the Portal Avenue woods received a gold award in the past for its conservation work.

Someone has dumped three piles of dirt, grass and some paper and cardboard  
rubbish in the entrance to the woodland opposite Bradford Court. This is one of  
those things that happens now and again and every time MHHL point out that it is  
unsightly, illegal and irresponsible. The woodland should be a poor soil environment  
for wild plants to grow and any rubbish can enrich or pollute soil. It is only the  
minority who do this sort of thing and we can only put it down to ignorance, laziness  
or arrogance.

If you notice anyone taking sacks or wheeling a wheelbarrow into the woods or onto  
the SSSI please give MHHL a call or email with any information you might have so  
that we can stop this sort of thing happening.

There are issues again with some large trees around the village needing attention. If  
you have brought tree problems to our attention they will receive an assessment at  
some time but we are very short of Directors and cannot necessarily make a visit as  
soon as we receive a call.

## MARTLESHAM PARISH COUNCIL

### Vacancy for a Parish Councillor

Following our uncontested elections in May the Parish Council is in a position to co-opt a councillor so if you thought of standing but didn't get round to it there is still an opportunity at our September meeting! Please contact the Clerk for further details.

### Projects and Grants

The Parish Council will be considering all applications for grants from local organisations in the autumn. If your group wishes to apply for a grant, please contact the Clerk (details below) for an application form, to be completed and returned to the Parish Council by Monday 17 October 2011. These grants are awarded for the financial year 2012/13 and the funds will be issued in May 2012. Any group with a project requiring Parish Council support/funding should also submit their project details and business plan by 17 October 2011 at the latest.

### Suffolk Coastal District Council Local Development Framework

The District Council announced the dates of its Cabinet and full Council meetings in July to consider a Reviewed Core Strategy Update. As we go to press the Cabinet meeting unanimously agreed to recommend to the full Council that the Reviewed Core Strategy be submitted for examination. Whilst there were minor changes in the document the Cabinet were satisfied that the

proposed strategic housing growth east of the A12 can be achieved without adverse effect to the nature conservation interests of the area.

The full District Council meets on 27th July to consider final submission of the LDF and the papers for the meeting including the subsequent minutes will be found on the Suffolk Coastal District Council Web site.

### BMX Project

Following a public consultation, which showed over 90% support for the provision of a BMX track in Martlesham, the Parish Council agreed at its meeting on 6 July 2011 to site a new track on the Jubilee Playspace, accessed from Main Road. The Project Group is very aware of some residents' concerns and measures will be taken to address them. It is working with the Police on the project.

### Thatched properties in Martlesham

Suffolk Fire & Rescue are compiling a 'thatch register' of all properties in the county with a thatched roof. The number of thatch fires has increased in Suffolk and they wish to help owners and residents by providing information to reduce the risk of fire. It will also be helpful information for the control room if they have to attend an incident. Only addresses of properties are required, not personal details. The Council has identified 3 properties: Martlesham Antiques, the Roundhouse, Church

Lane, and Thatched Farm, Waldringfield Road. If you are aware of any other thatched properties within the parish please contact the Clerk below who will pass the address on to Suffolk Fire & Rescue.

## SUFFOLK COUNTY COUNCIL

is introducing intelligent street lighting in your area.

Contractors working on behalf of the county council will soon be seen installing an 'intelligent street lighting system' to control the street lights around Martlesham. The system which will be active from 19 March, will allow the council to switch off some street lights, dim some or leave them on remotely.

The lights will have fully adjustable settings, which means that settings can be altered for different days of the week, take account of British Summertime, or set street lights to stay on for longer e.g. for events or at Christmas.

All street lights owned by the county council that are six metres in height or below are to be switched off between the hours of midnight and 5:30am.

The council will be using the following criteria to consider whether lights should be kept on for a longer period:

Lights at major junctions/roundabouts

In town centres with CCTV, high security businesses e.g. banks, areas of high night time pedestrian usage, for example near nightclubs and train stations, outside community facilities or leisure centres

Areas where street lights are needed to reduce road accidents

Areas where there could be an increase in crime through reduced lighting, e.g. pubs and specific residential areas.

Remote alleys linking residential streets  
Near pedestrian crossings, footbridges, subways

In public car parks

At bus stops

At level crossings, speed humps and traffic lights

Where there is sheltered housing for the elderly

The decision about which street lights to keep on and which should be switched off has been made in consultation with local town and parish councils, Suffolk police and your local county councillors. The county council is moving to this new system in order to save money, it is estimated that the council will save £550,000 a year in energy bills and to save carbon.

## **CHRIS BLUNDEL'S COUNCILLOR REPORT AUGUST 2011**

### **The Local Development Framework: Core Strategy.**

The final Cabinet and full Council meeting dates of 9th July and Wednesday 27th July 2011 respectfully to determine the LDF Core Strategy were not announced until after the deadline for the July magazine publication had passed which was unfortunate. By the time you read this at the end of July it is most likely that the Core Strategy will have been approved by Council and will be in preparation for onward transmission to the Government Inspector for final approval. The next stages in the LDF program are the Area Action Plans (AAP) and the Site Specific Proposals (SSP). Martlesham is one of the five areas currently selected as an AAP along with Felixstowe and three others.

### **Further developments at Suffolk Coastal DC**

To continue the process of increased efficiency the council has agreed to reduce the number of formal full council meetings from 11 to 7 per annum and use the remaining 4 as both briefing and training sessions for both councillors and others. How this will work out in practice remains to be seen but the officers have made a good start. Also the start time for the full council meetings has been brought forward to 7.00pm and 6.30pm for all other evening meetings. Some committees will continue to meet in the daytime such as Licensing and Development Control. I have been asked to serve on the Grants Task Group, the highly influential Development Policy Task Group and to be available as a first reserve member of the Development Control Committee. The total number of sub-committees has been reduced. The Green Issues and the Information Technology sub-Committees have been absorbed into the Development Policy Task Group so I will still be taking a personal interest in green issues that have become so important of late.

### **The Police Investigation Centre**

The centre opened for business on the 10th June 2011 and at the time of writing I have learned of no adverse problems, however, should any arise I would be pleased to hear about them. ## **JOHN KELSO'S DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT AUGUST 2011**

### **Suffolk Coastal Cabinet Meeting**

The Cabinet meeting held at Trinity Park on Friday 8th July provided no new concessions on the location of new housing in the Councils Local Development Framework (LDF) Core strategy. Despite the strength of arguments put forward by myself and other local Councillors, plus, the letter sent from No Adastral New Towns (NANTs) solicitor advising of serious discrepancies and inaccuracies contained in the Councils document and advising the Council that NANT may apply for a Judicial Review if these errors are not corrected before adoption of the LDF. At the time of writing this report we still have the opportunity to try and convince the Full Council meeting (due to be held 27th July) that the location proposed for 2,000 new houses adjacent to the Deben Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) is the wrong one and that the whole of the Suffolk Coastal area would be better served by the housing numbers being distributed more evenly amongst all of our communities each one taking its fair share. I will report on the Full Councils decision in the September edition.

### **Planning Application to Extend Hunters Ride Farriers Close**

At last some good news for Martlesham residents. The latest information that I have received regarding the planning application to extend the flats at Hunters Ride, Farriers Close is that officers were minded to refuse permission, so the applicant has withdrawn the plans but will be contesting the Tree Preservation Order that has been issued by Suffolk Coastal and may possibly make a revised application sometime within the next twelve months. I will be keeping the situation under review and will advise of any updates as and when they occur.

### **Bloor Homes Planning Application**

At the time of writing the Council is still awaiting for the amended plans to develop Mr Pipe's field and Mill Farm to arrive from Bloor Homes. When the plans are received they will be reissued for consultation. The advice that I have been given by officers is that it is unlikely to go to Committee until September at the earliest. I will of course keep residents advised of any progress.

### **BT Planning Application**

A new Planning Officer has been

employed by Suffolk Coastal to replace Paul Coffey to specifically work on the BT application and to present a report to The Development Control Committee. I am advised by Phil Ridley, Head of Planning that this is not likely to happen until September at the earliest. But please check out [www.noadastralnewtown.com](http://www.noadastralnewtown.com) and [www.suffolkcoastal.gov.uk](http://www.suffolkcoastal.gov.uk) as well as Parish Council noticeboards for the most up to date information.

## **SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD TEAM**

### **The cycles of anti-social behaviour**

Three things usually rise during the summer months; the amount of sunshine, the temperature, and from a police perspective, the number of anti-social behaviour incidents reported to us. Unfortunately, this summer we add a fourth rise; the number of insecure cycles being stolen.

Firstly though, I want to draw your attention to one particular area where anti-social behaviour is causing particular harassment, alarm and distress. What's even worse though is that it's risking the very lives of children, and that is totally and wholly unacceptable. I am referring to the shopping plaza on Broadlands Way in Rushmere St Andrew.

Most concerning here are the vehicles which are mounting the footpath and using the plaza as a short cut between Broadlands Way and Brendon Drive. These inconsiderate and thoughtless motorists are driving within inches of the Just Learning nursery front door just to shave five minutes off their journey time. The message to you is STOP! It's an offence, it's unsafe, it's unacceptable and it's likely to end in serious injury or something even worse! If you are seen doing this you can expect to be dealt with robustly.

The Kesgrave and District Safer Neighbourhood Team has been working very hard to try and educate cycle owners on the need to lock their bikes wherever they are left unattended and for no matter how short a period. The message has clearly not got across though and cycles are still being stolen

needlessly. We regularly see unlocked cycles thrown on the ground outside shops or dropped in front gardens.

We hear it time again – "I've only been in the shop two minutes". So how long does it take to steal a cycle if it's left unlocked? The answer - less time than it's taken you to read the question! If you 'advertise' your cycle as unlocked by leaving the lock secured around the handlebars or frame, then you might just as well put up a sign saying 'insecure'. Cycles also get stolen from insecure garages and other buildings. These crimes are avoidable and that is now recognised by some insurance companies who will now not pay out if insecurities like this have been a factor in the crime. Can you afford that loss? Quality cycle locks and other security items are available for sale from your local safer neighbourhood team.

The primary role of a Police Community Support Officer is high visibility patrols. This is one of the ways in which we meet you to discuss issues affecting you and where we deal with those issues with our partner agencies to improve the quality of life for everyone. We want to be out and about doing this every minute that we are on duty, but we often find ourselves out of service dealing with anti-social behaviour in the plaza or with taking crime reports for stolen insecure cycles.

So please, let's lock up our cycles and lock down the anti-social behaviour in the plaza so that the Kesgrave Safer Neighbourhood Team can help you enjoy the summer as much as possible. Please do not hesitate to contact me or one of my colleagues if we can help you on this or any other matter.

Many thanks to all those who supported us at our car boot stall at Music on the Green by buying some plants, making a donation or talking to us about your own wildlife observations. It was great to hear them.

We conducted our count of the Silver Studded Blue butterflies present on the heath SSSI on Sunday 10th July. The total counted was lower than last year. However this low value was most probably due to the record early emergence of the butterfly, and so we

were a long way past the peak population. Loss of some butterflies due to the fires in the spring is also likely to be a contributing factor. Further analysis of the results is in progress. We managed to find some butterflies on the northern part of the SSSI albeit in only small numbers. Hopefully heather will regenerate in the burnt areas and will provide fresh areas for this rare and beautiful butterfly to colonise from the small pockets that remain. Other butterflies found whilst conducting the count of the Silver Studded Blues were Meadow Brown, Ringlet, Small Skipper, Essex Skipper, Large Skipper, Common Blue, Brown Argus, Small Copper, Large White, Small White, Green Veined White, Peacock, Red Admiral, and Purple Hairstreak. We also were lucky enough to see two Hummingbird Hawkmoths nectar feeding on a Buddleia bush.

Whilst walking around the SSSI we noted that a lot of work needs to be done to bring the heath back to a good condition. The bracken has expanded greatly and taken over in some areas. Our next working party will be on Sunday 14th August. We aim to try to recover some heathland habitat or at least check its decline. Please join us to help. No particular skill or previous knowledge is required, all tools will be provided on the day. Please meet outside the Douglas Bader pub at 10am or join us on the heath.

'Flowers for the home' was the title of Mrs Linda Harman's demonstration and for her arrangements Linda likes to use fresh flowers from the local supermarkets, foliage from her garden along with some dried flowers. Starting off was a pretty pink design in a small basket of spray carnations, roses, freesias and gypsophila. She then took a small pink pottery jar topped with moss and added heads of tiny pink roses. A pot plant wrapped in coloured paper and placed in a small cotton bag. Both these designs small and easily done and looked very effective. Following on she produced a striking arrangement of deep red gerberas, adding cut stems, bronze foliage, eucalyptus leaves with four thin strips bent and tied together at the top. For a simple table design a ring of pink alstromeria, pistachio spray carnations, white carnations and dried purple eryngiums. Two similar smaller designs were placed on top, creating a three tier effect. Linda then made a hand-tied arrangement. Lastly a small arrangement of deep purple irises and Californian blue bells wrapped together with lilac coloured paper. Coloured butterflies were added to perfectly finish off each of her designs. The competition was won by Mrs Ann Chisem with Mrs Florence Fisher winning the novice class.
